Golden Yarrow	<i>Eriophyllum conferiflorum</i>	Sunflower (Asteraceae)			

Laurel Sumac	<i>Malosma laurina</i>	Sumac (Anacardaceae)			Taco leaves.
Lemonadeberry	<i>Rhus integrifolia</i>	Sumac (Anacardaceae)			Try a berry – they taste like Sweet Tarts (suck it, spit out the seed).
Mission Manzanita	<i>Xylococcus bicolor</i>	Buckthorn (Rhamnaceae)			ID hint: the underside of the leaves are whitish
Mountain Mahogany	<i>Cercocarpus betuloides</i>	Rose (Rosaceae)			
Sticky Monkeyflower	<i>Mimulus aurantiacus</i>	Lopseed (Phrymaceae)			Both flower colors are the same species.
Tarweed	<i>Deiandra fasciculata</i>	Sunflower (Asteraceae)			Feel the leaves to know how it got its name.
Toyon	<i>Heteromeles arubifolia</i>	Rose (Rosaceae)			
Wart-stem Ceanothus	<i>Ceanothus verrucosus</i>	Buckthorn (Rhamnaceae)			ID Hint: Look for bumps on stem, wrinkly leaves
